Right now, per capita consumption of alcoholic beverage is the highest it has ever been in America. Over the past 30 years, alcohol consumption has increased over 26% in America to the rate of 2.7 gallons of straight alcohol per adult per year. One out of ten of the 100 plus million Americans who drink is now a full-fledged alcoholic or at least a problem drinker. Of the ten million problem drinkers in America, thousands are under 21. Over 30% of High School students in the US consume alcohol in some form every week.

After heart disease and cancer, alcoholism is the country's biggest health problem. There are over 200,000 deaths per year contributed to alcoholism, most of which die of cirrhosis of the liver. In half of all the murders in the U.S., either the killer or the victim--or both have been drinking. A fourth of all suicides are found to have had significant amounts of alcohol in their bloodstreams. People who use alcohol are seven times more likely to be separated or divorced. The dollar cost of alcoholism may be as much as \$30-\$40 billion a year, much of it from lost work time in business, industry, and the government. Half of each years' 55,500 automobile deaths can be traced to drinking. But beyond all of these alarming figures that reveal the horribleness of drinking, the Word of God says that drinking alcohol is sin! Let us see what type of sin drinking really is.

Today is the day to make that total surrender of your life to Christ an stop this foolishness of drinking alcohol.
